The Emu's have been moved to their breeding pens. Soon it will be time to brave the weather and try to get those precious eggs before the winter chills freeze them. Emus unlike other birds begin their breeding and laying season as the days become shorter. The female will lay her egg every three to five days. The male will build the nest and if permitted will incubate up to eight eggs for approximately fifty four days. In their native land of Australia and other warmer climates this is certainly the way to go. But here in the great north we collect and incubate the eggs for him. It is said that a female Emu is capable of laying between twenty and fifty eggs in a season, climate has a strong influence on these numbers.

REINDEER are members of the cervidae (deer) family. Adults stand 3 1/2 feet at the shoulder and weight from 250 to 350 lbs. Their coat is dense, Warm and water-proof. Reindeer differ from other deer in that both males



and females have antlers and their very broad hooves are designed for walking on snow. Reindeer have been domesticated for centuries by the Sami of Northern Scandinavia and



Russia, who use them as draft and pack animals as well as a source of food. Reindeer give birth to a single fawn following a 224 day gestation. Twins are very rare. Reindeer are a domestic animal.
